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## 1.0 INVESTIGATION AND MONITORING

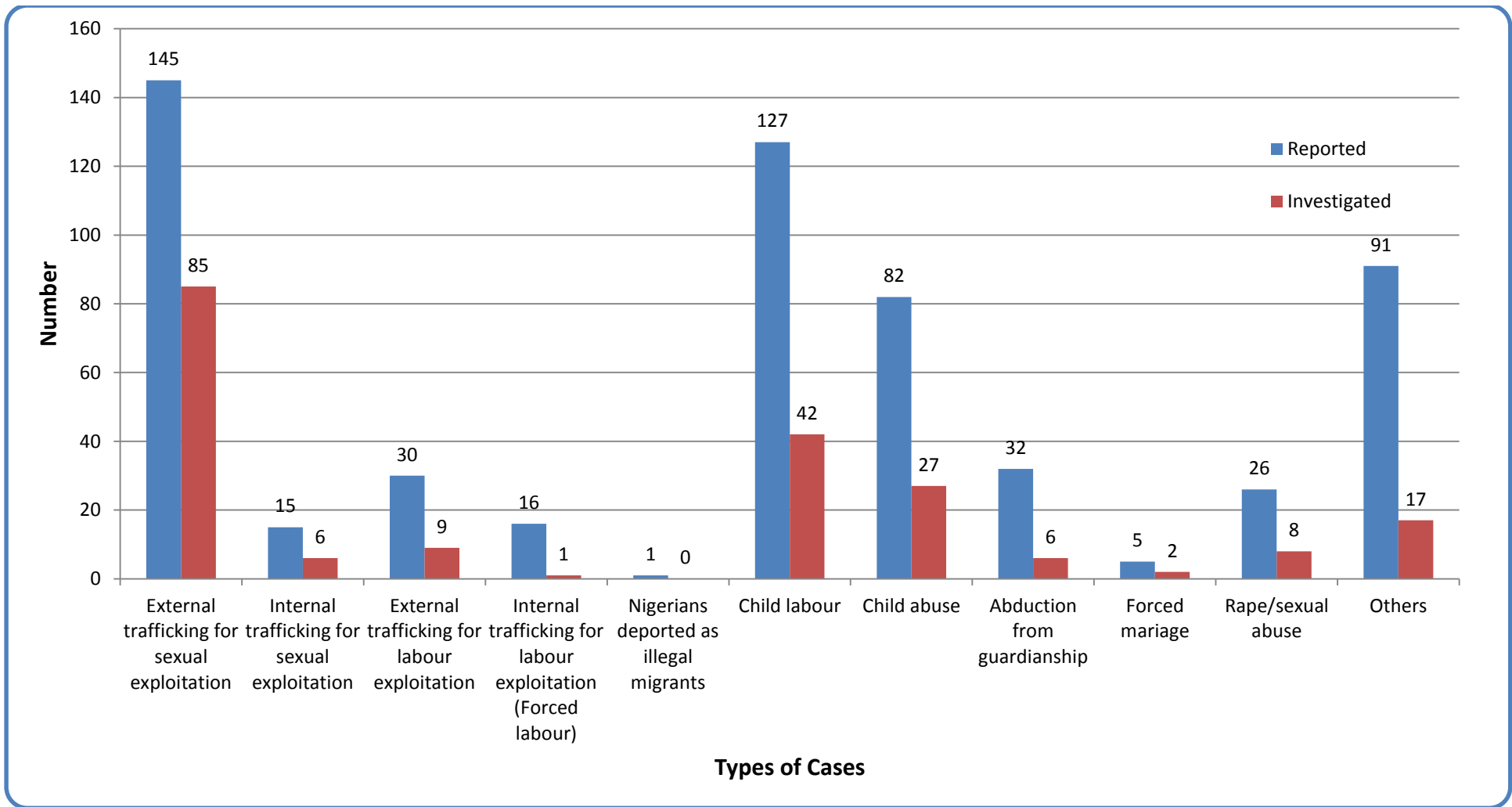
In the year under review, a total of Five Hundred and Seventy (570) cases were reported to the Agency. This brings the total number of cases of human trafficking reported to the Agency from inception to Three thousand, Eight Hundred and Ninety Nine (3,899) cases.

Out of the 570 cases reported, Two Hundred and Three (203) cases, representing 35.6% of the number were successfully investigated.

The highest number of cases reported came from External trafficking for sexual exploitation, with 145 (25.4%), Child Labour, with 127 (22.3%), and Child Abuse, with 82 (14.4%) of the cases.

The least reported cases came from Nigerians deported as illegal migrants, with 1 (0.2%), Forced Marriage, with 5 (0.9%), and Internal trafficking for sexual exploitation, with 15 (2.6%) cases.

Cases reported and investigated

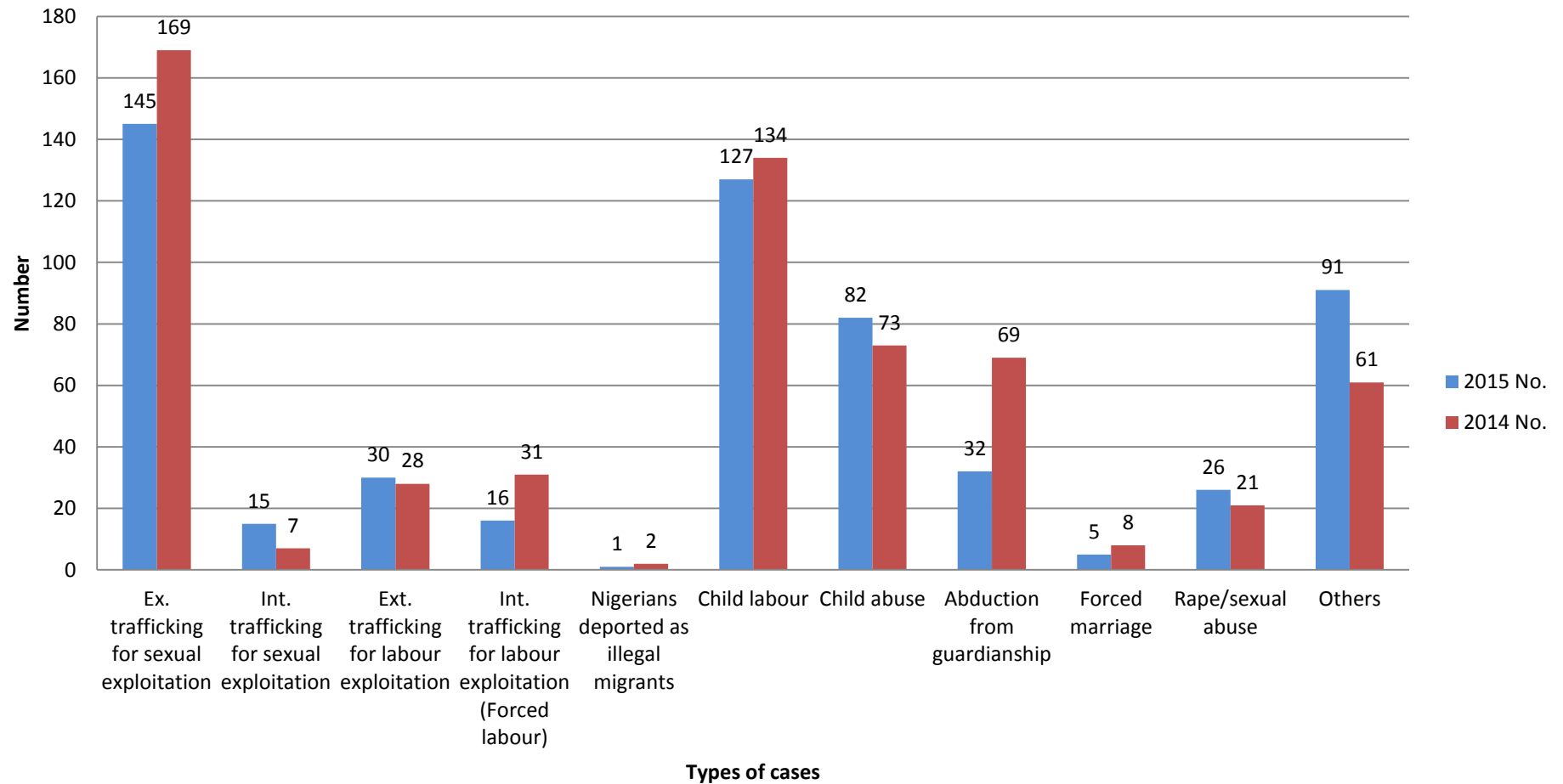
## 1.1 COMPARISON OF CASES REPORTED IN THE YEAR 2015 AND 2014

In 2015, Internal Trafficking for Sexual Exploitation had an increase of 119.3% in reportage when compared to 2014. This was followed by Rape/Sexual Abuse of minors with an increase of 30.3% and Child Abuse with an increase of 18.9% in reportage when compared with 2014.

With 50.8%, abduction from guardianship witnessed a decrease in reportage in 2015, as against 2014. Internal trafficking for labour exploitation and Nigerians deported as illegal migrants also witnessed a decrease in reportage with 45.0% and 41.5%, respectively.

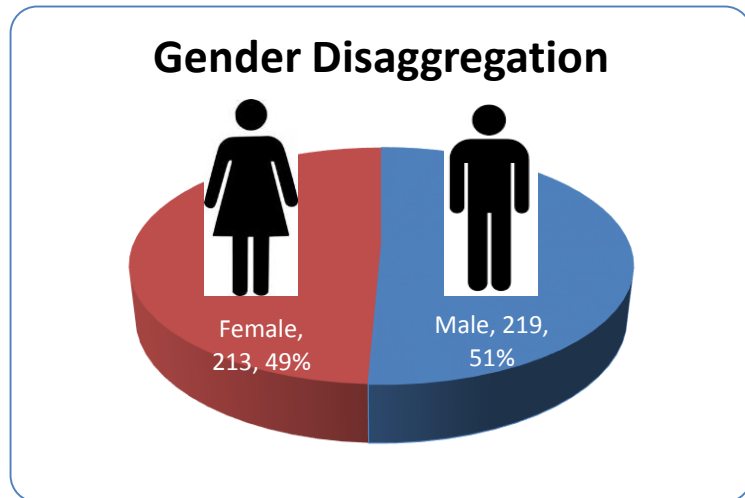

## 1.2 SUSPECTED TRAFFICKERS

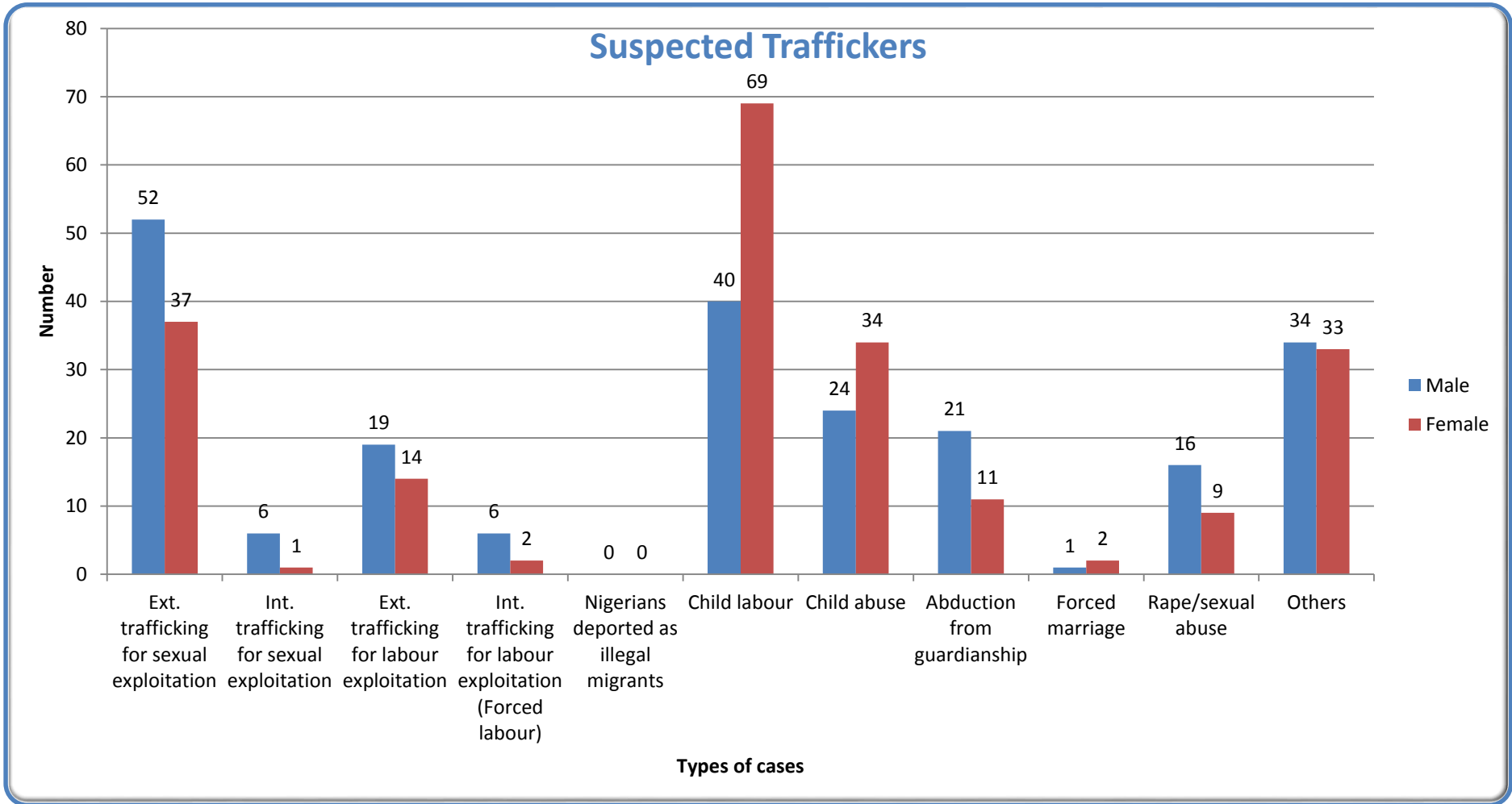
A total number of Four hundred and thirty two (432) suspected traffickers were apprehended, in the year under review, out of which Two hundred and nineteen (219) were males and Two hundred and thirteen (213) were females.



Child labour had the highest number of suspected traffickers with 109 suspects; 40 males and 69 females. External trafficking for sexual exploitation and Child Abuse had 89 (52 males and 37 females) and 58 suspects (24 males and 34 females) respectively.

The least suspects came from Forced Marriage, Internal trafficking for sexual exploitation and Internal trafficking for labour exploitation, with 3, 7 and 8 suspects arrested respectively.

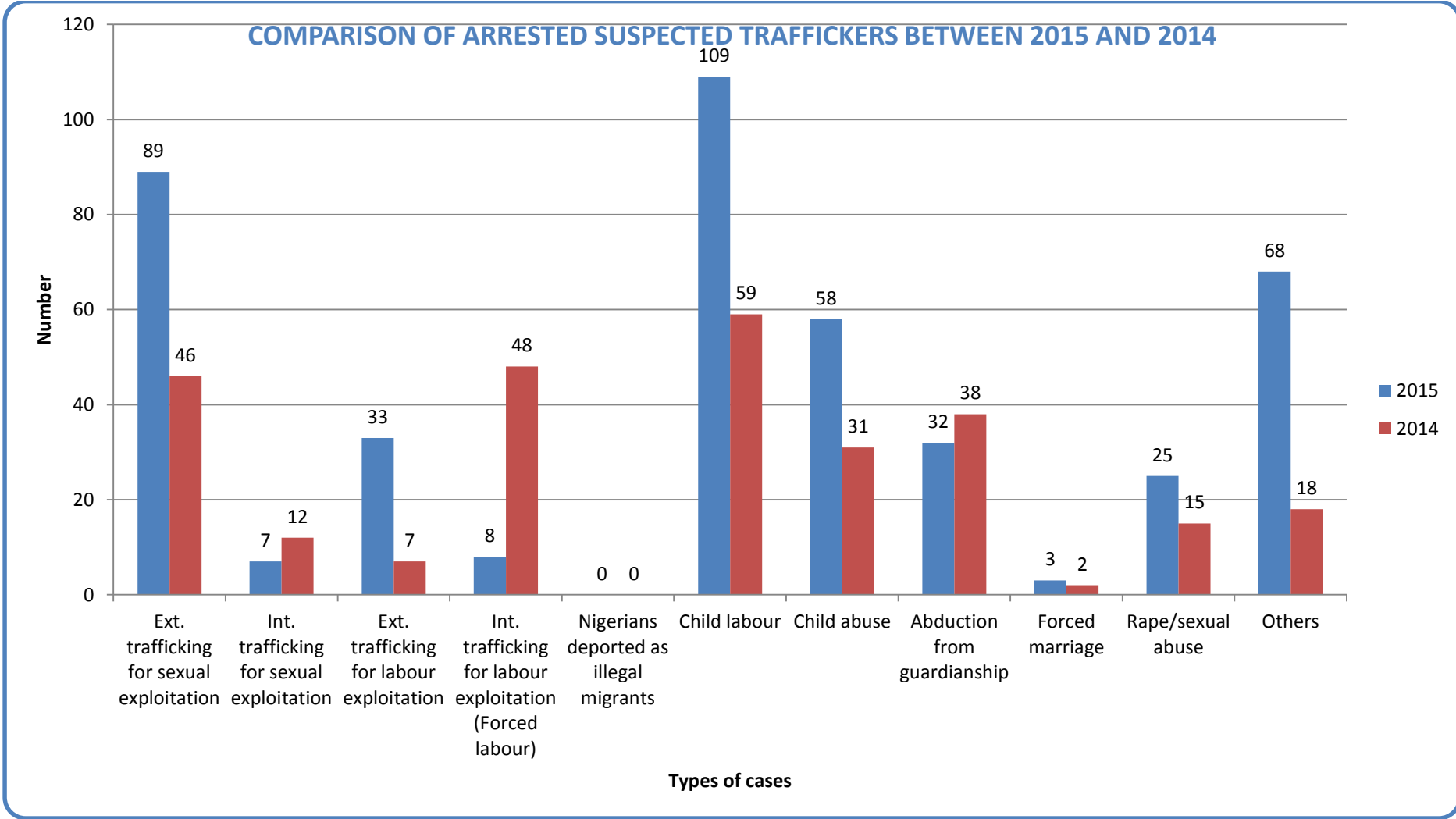


### 1.2.1 COMPARISON OF ARRESTED SUSPECTED TRAFFICKERS BETWEEN 2015 AND 2014

During the year under review, the Agency recorded an increase of 204% in the number of suspects arrested for External trafficking for labour exploitation compared to 2014. There was also an increase in the number of suspects arrested for External trafficking for sexual exploitation and Child abuse with 23.4% and 19.6% respectively.

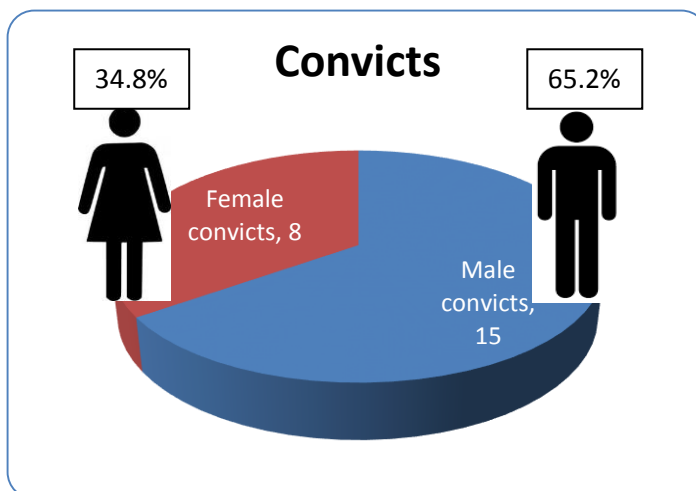
Internal trafficking for labour exploitation saw 89.1% decrease on suspects arrested in 2015 as compared with arrests made in 2014. Internal trafficking for sexual exploitation and Abduction from guardianship had a reduction of 62.8% and 46.4% as compared with figures of 2014.

## 2.0 PROSECUTION AND CONVICTIONS

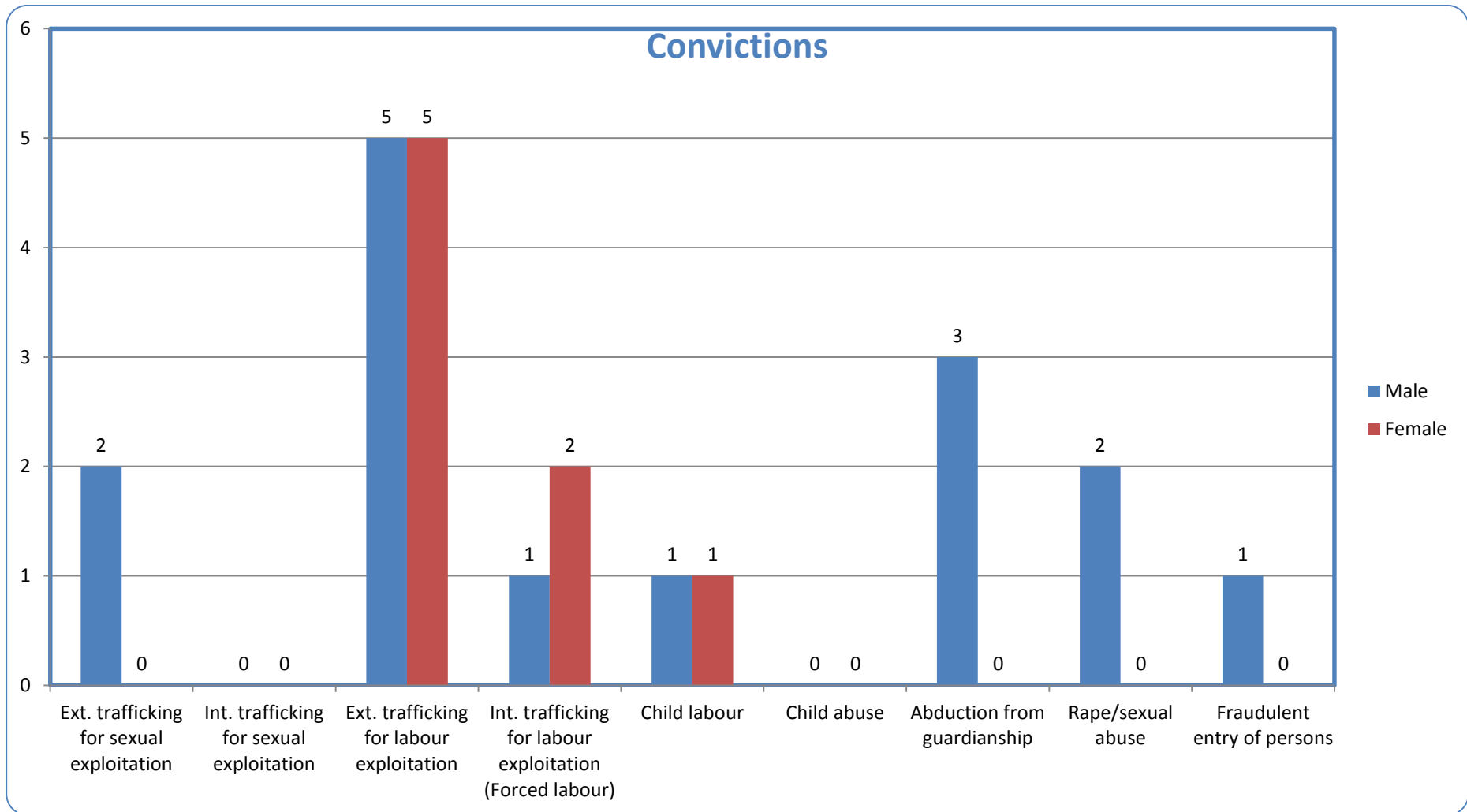
The Agency won a total number of Eighteen (18) cases, which saw Twenty three (23) people; 15 males and 8 females, convicted of different offences. This brings the total number of convictions to Two hundred and thirty six (236) and the total number of convicted persons to Two hundred and Eighty (280) since inception.



External trafficking for sexual exploitation got the highest number of convicted traffickers, representing 43.5% of the total number. Internal trafficking for labour exploitation and Abduction from guardianship had a tie, with 3 convicted traffickers each, representing 13% of the total number.

Fraudulent entry of persons, a new offence from the newly enacted Act of the Agency got one conviction, representing 4.4% of the total convicts.

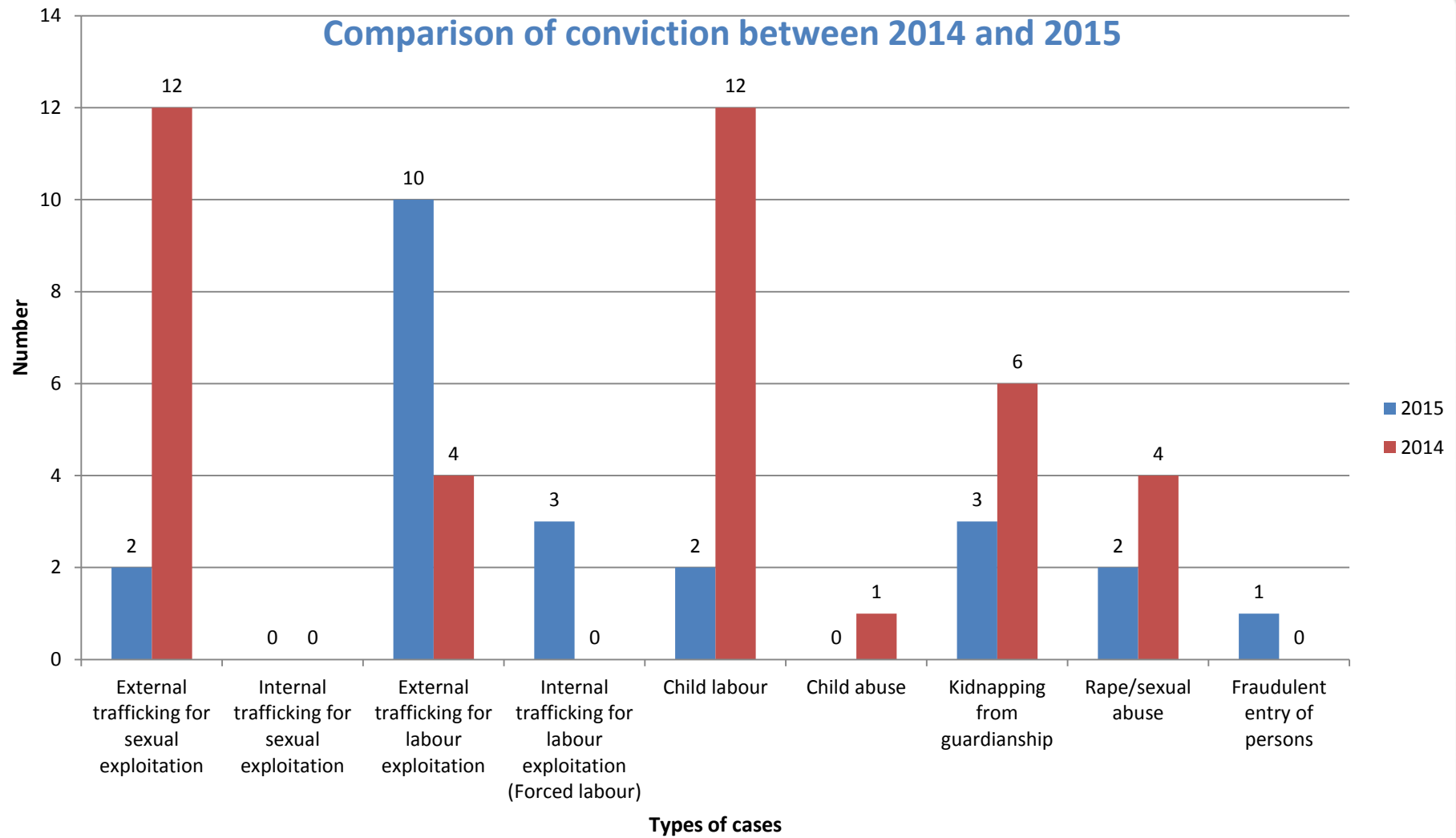
## 2.1 COMPARISON BETWEEN 2015 AND 2014

In 2015, the Agency had a total of Twenty Three (23) convicts compared to 2014 that recorded a total of Thirty Nine (39) convicts.

External and Internal trafficking for labour exploitation recorded an increase of 322.3% and 300% respectively in the number of convicted traffickers in 2015 compared to 2014.

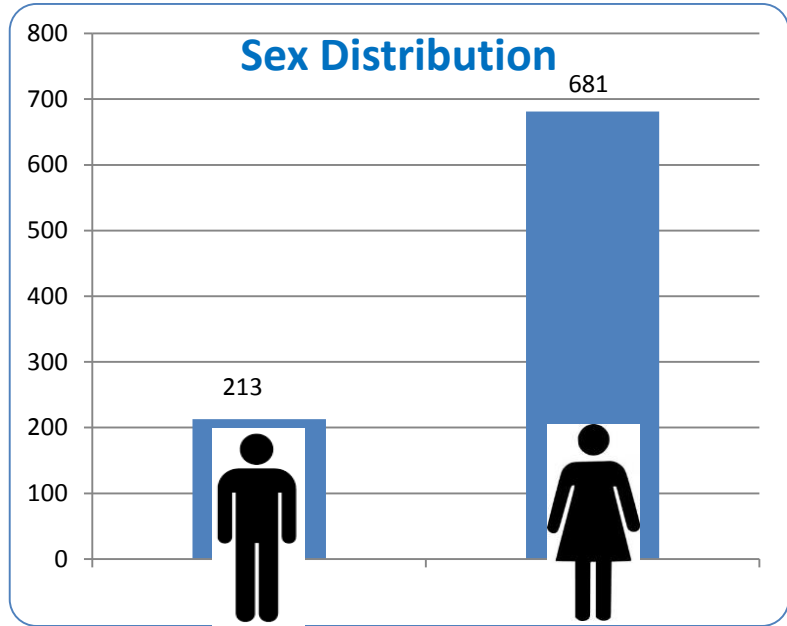
### Comparison of conviction between 2014 and 2015



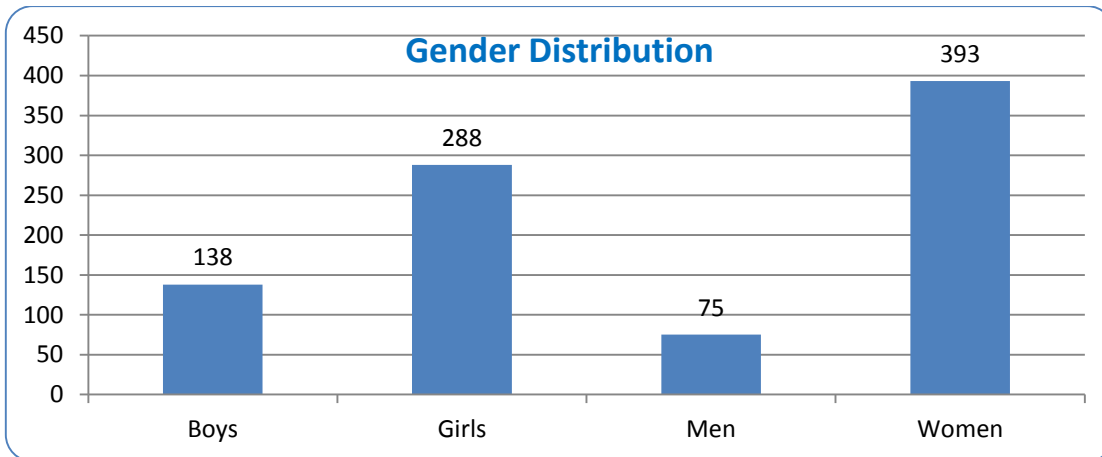
### 3.0 RESCUED VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

The Agency rescued a total number of Eight hundred and ninety four (894) victims of human trafficking in 2015. This brings the total to Nine thousand, Four hundred and Fifty three (9,453) victims rescued by the Agency since inception.

Out of the total number of victims rescued, Two hundred and thirteen (213) were males and Six hundred and eighty one (681) were females.



Further analysis indicated that there were 138 boys, 288 girls, 75 men and 393 women. These can be illustrated as follows:

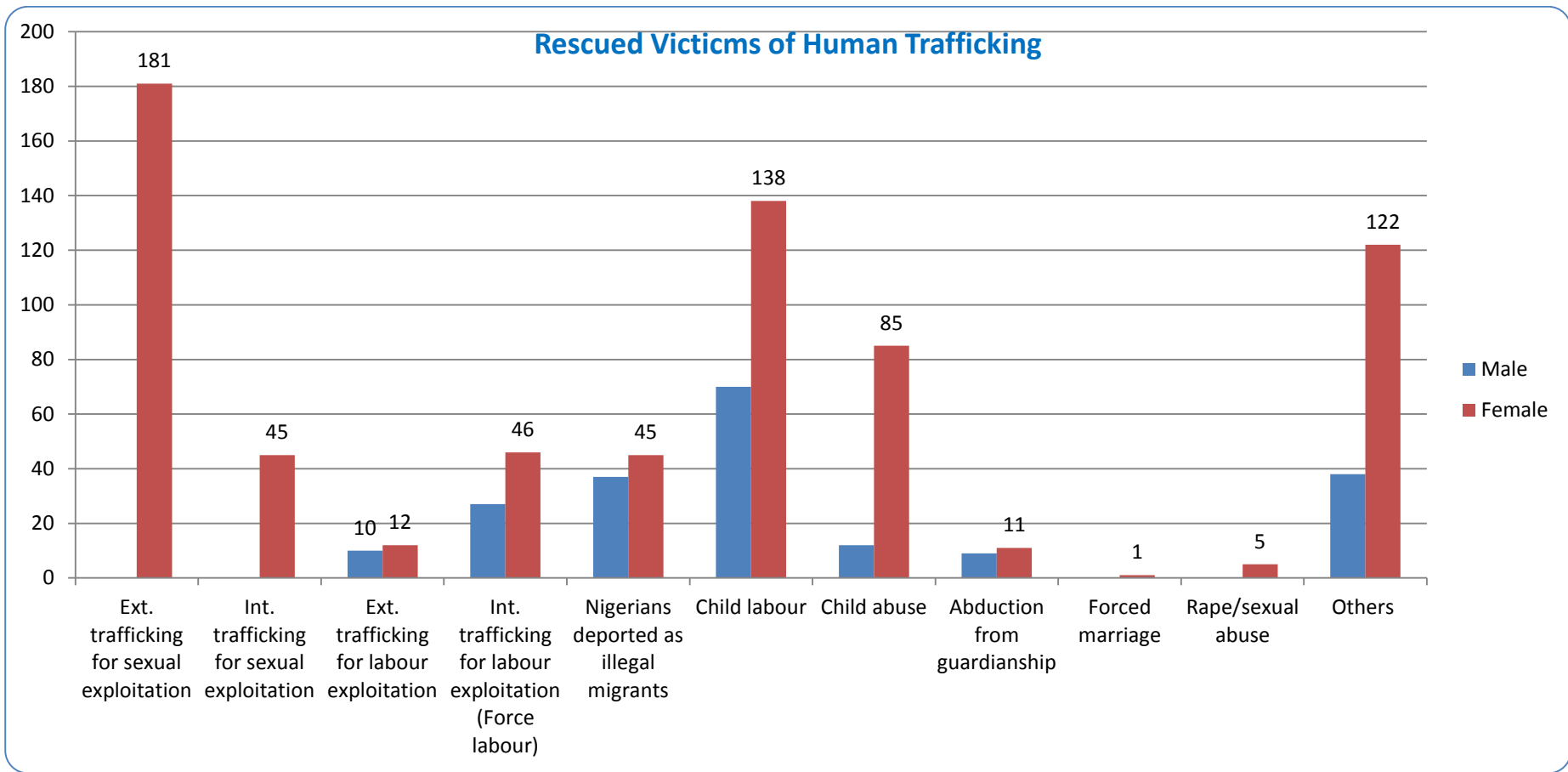


The highest number of victims rescued came from Child labour (208), followed by External trafficking for sexual exploitation (181) and Child Abuse (97).

The least number of victims came from Forced marriage (1), Rape/sexual abuse (5) and Abduction from guardianship (20).

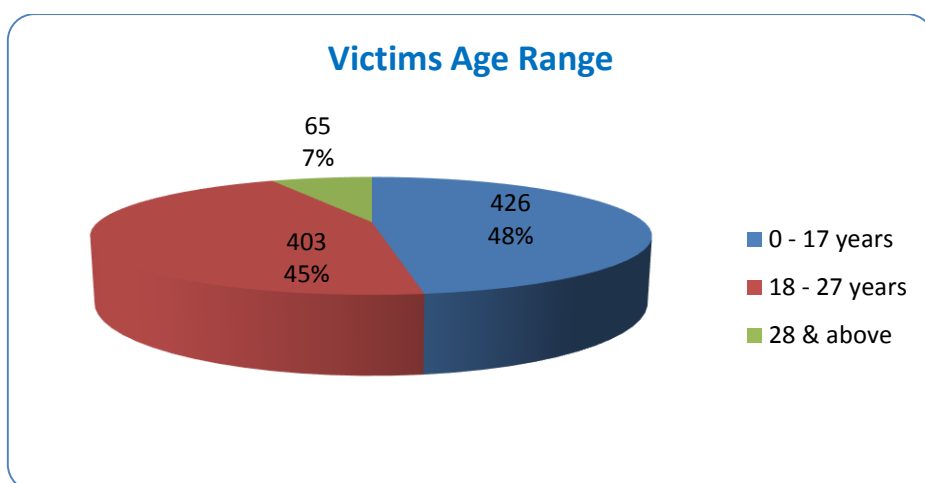




### 3.1 VICTIMS AGE RANGE

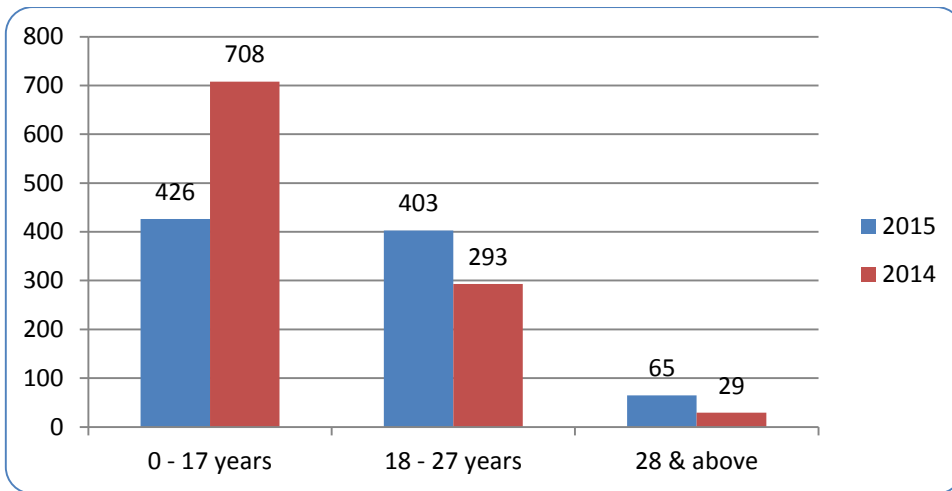


#### 3.1.1 COMPARISON OF VICTIMS AGE RANGE BETWEEN 2015 AND 2014

0-17years age range saw a decline of 32.2% in 2015 compared to 2014.

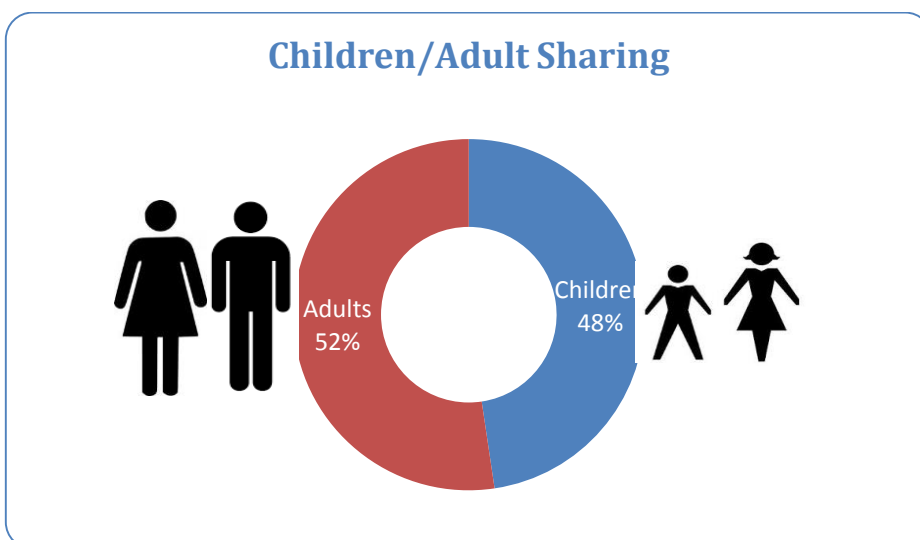

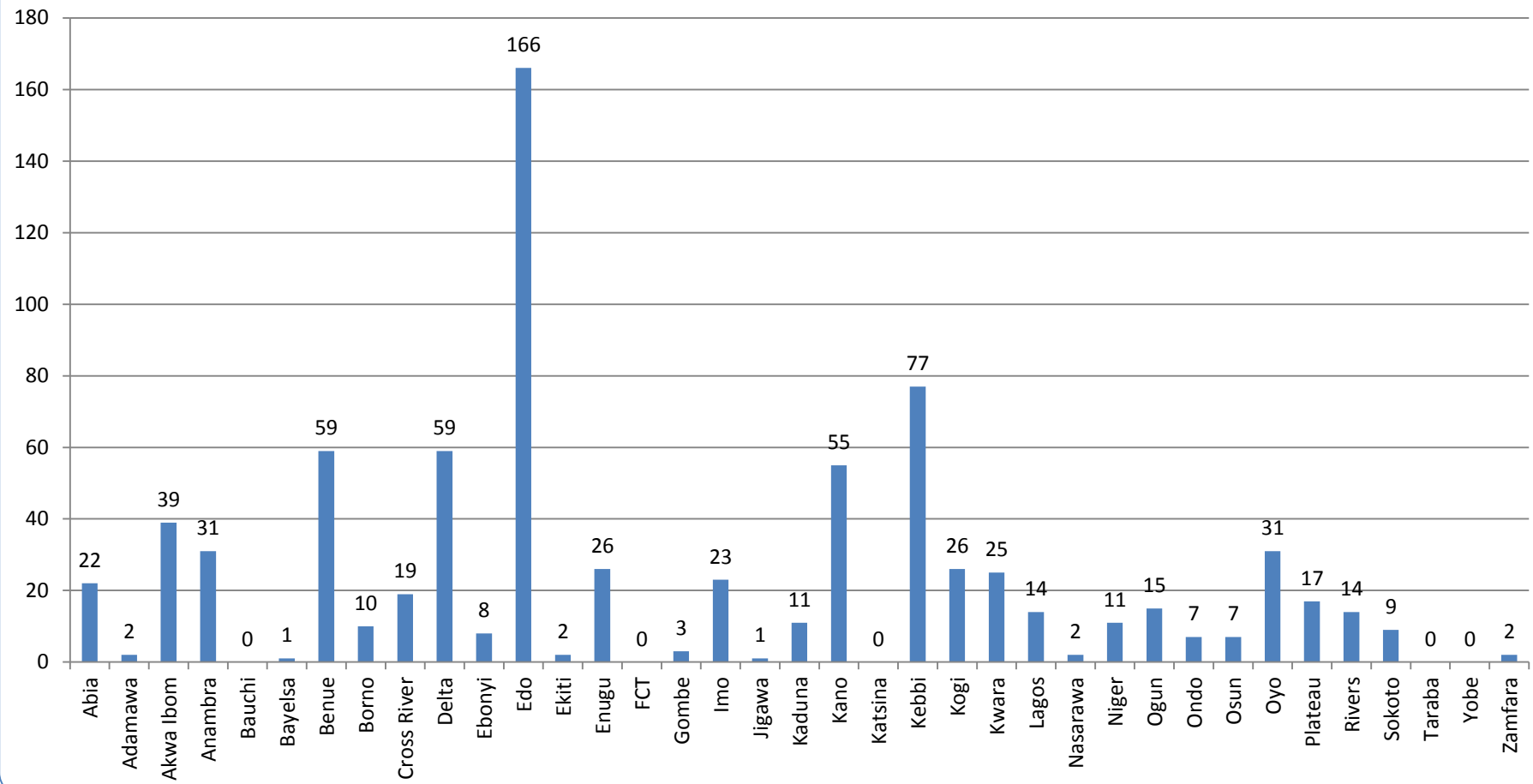
### 3.3 STATE DISTRIBUTION OF RESCUED VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

A total number of Seven hundred and ninety four (794) victims, out of 894 rescued were Nigerians. The highest number of victims came from Edo State (166), Kebbi State (77), and Benue and Delta (59).

No indigenes of Bauchi, Katsina, Taraba and Yobe States as well as FCT were identified as victims of human trafficking in the reporting year. Bayelsa and Jigawa States had a victim each, Adamawa, Ekiti, Nasarawa and Zamfara States had 2 victims each and Gombe had 3 victims.

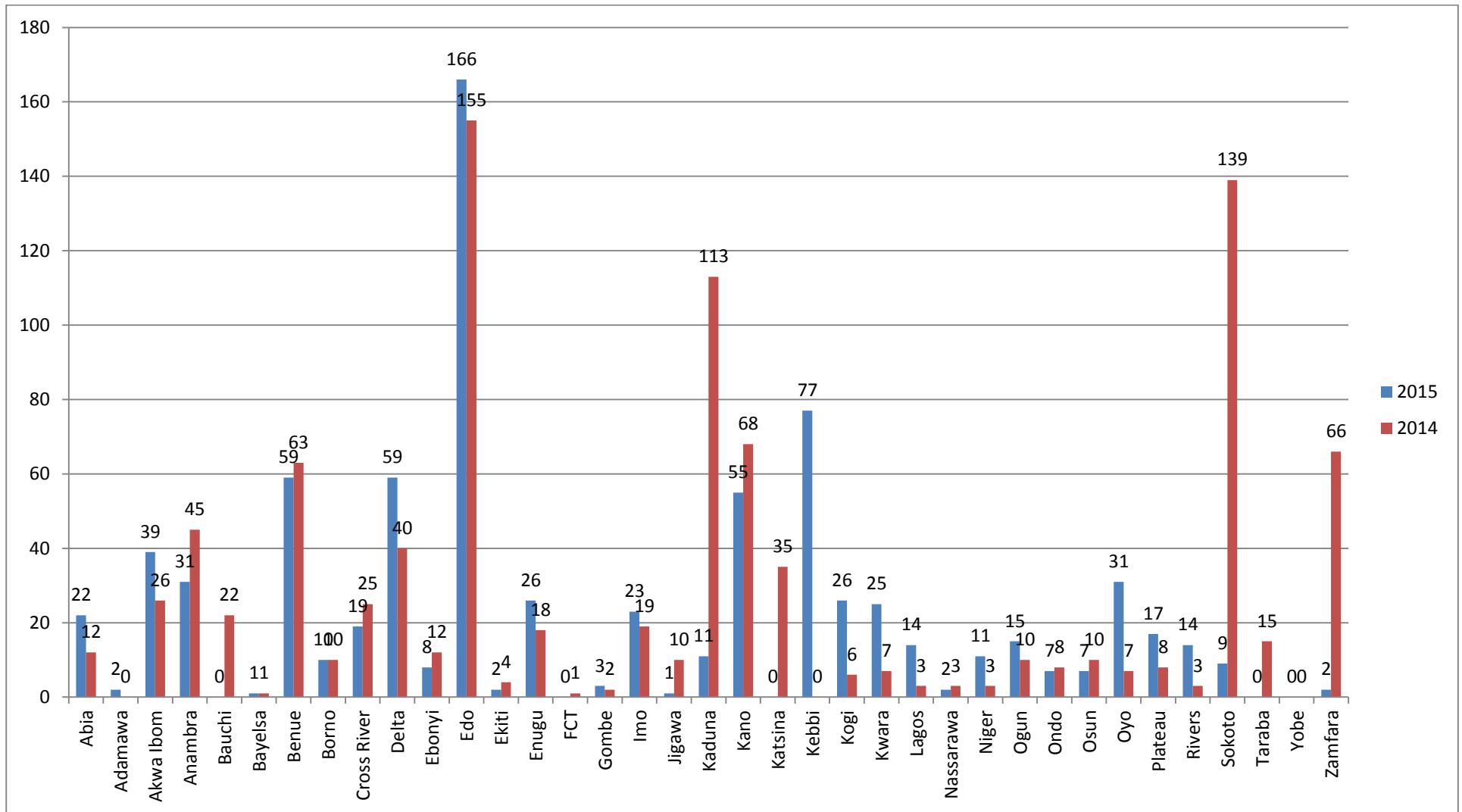

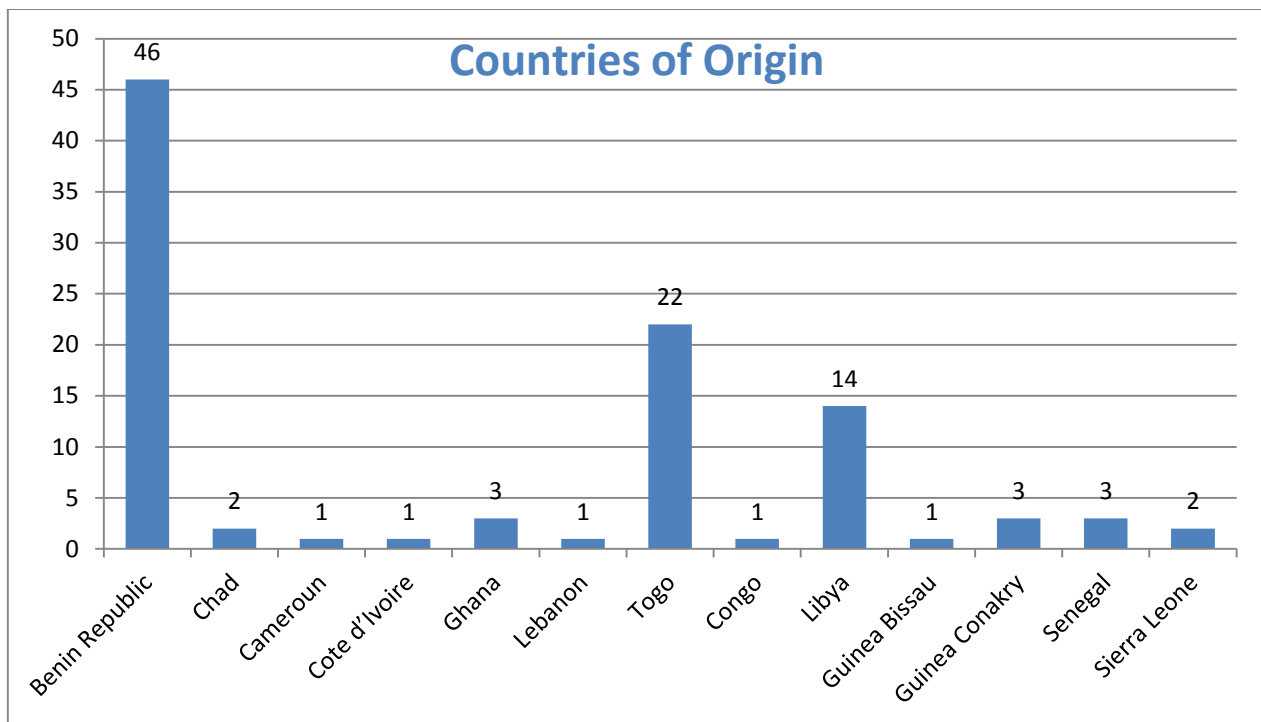
### 3.4 COUNTRIES OF ORIGIN OF RESCUED VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

### 3.5 RESCUE AGENCIES

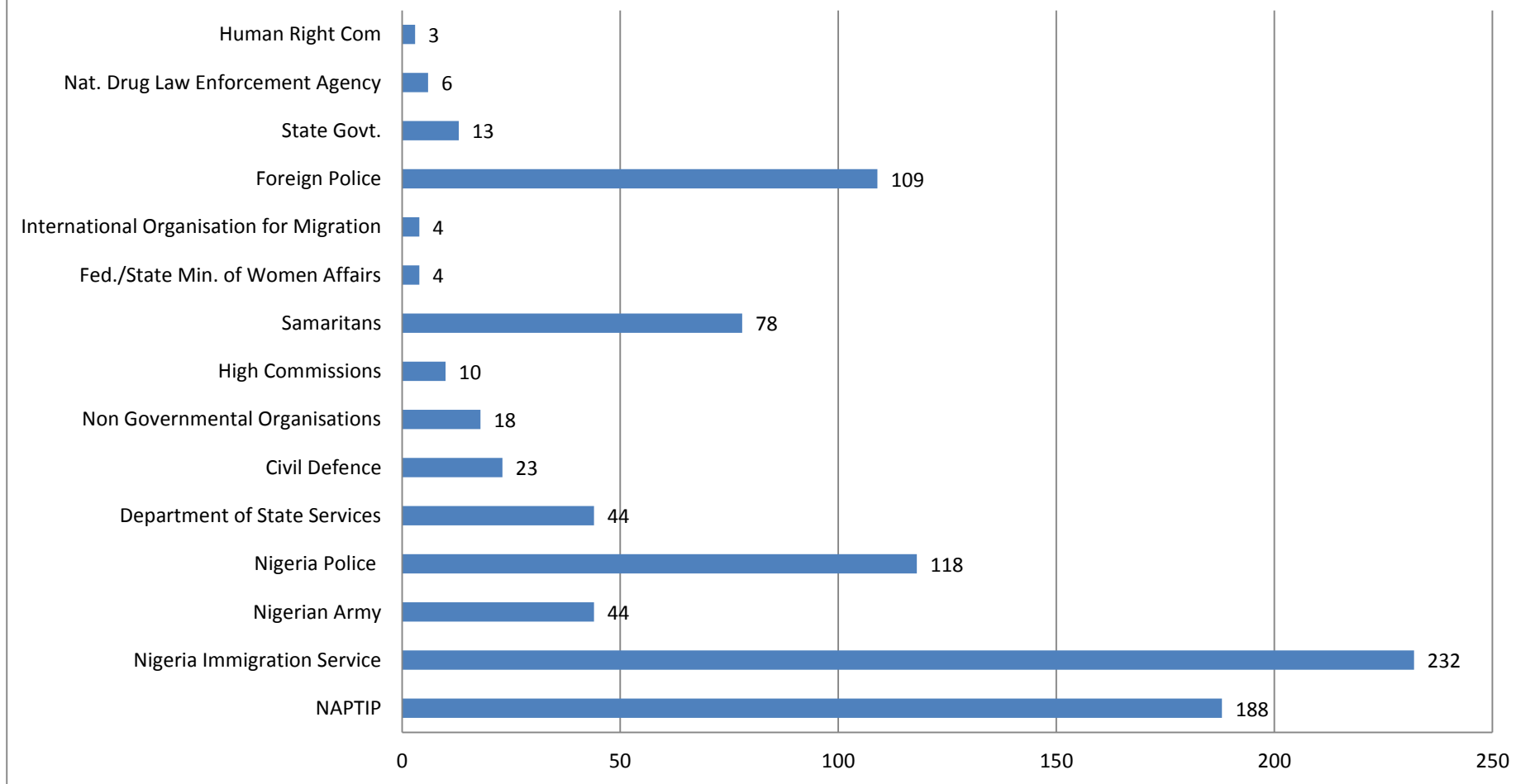
